THE BRIDGES OF WALLKILL (UPDATE)

By now, most of our readers will have either driven or walked across the handsome new bridge spanning the Wallkill River between the Post Office on the East Side and the old former American Legion Building on the West Side of the Bruyn Turnpike.

We at the Historical Society are especially pleased that the bridge has been named to honor the life and memory of our own Stewart Crowell who worked tirelessly for the public good, serving on the boards of The Historical Society, the Wallkill Public Library, and many other organizations, always looking for ways to make life better in the Hamlet.



The latest Wallkill Bridge is the third in that location. As you may remember (see Newsletter, Volume 16, Number 3, Fall 2016), the original crossing was a covered wooden bridge linking Wallkill Avenue on the eastern bank with the Bruyn Turnpike (then called Soap Hill Road) on the western. It anchored on materials from the Shawangunk Mountains: slate rock on the west, rock piers on the east, and mid-stream on a pier that can be seen to this day just north of today's bridge.



The replacement concrete bridge built in 1915 was located south of the covered bridge by a few hundred feet and cost \$24,360 to build. Amazingly Stewart Crowell's grandfather was the first to walk across the new bridge.

By the time the Ulster County Highway Department took over maintenance around 1937, the bridge needed major repairs - new walls, a new road, and new sidewalks. It took a year to complete the work and to add the iron

railings. During construction the County built a temporary bridge on the old covered bridge site.



It was a pretty bridge, painted by local artist Eugene Stevens, photographed by many, and did its job well. Apart from an awkward jag as one entered the bridge, from the west, there was always the glance at the water to check the water level over the dam, to sight any children playing in the shallows, or to appreciate the view.



Inevitably, the bridge condition deteriorated, and a replacement was necessary. The project fell under the jurisdiction of Department of Public Works, and its representatives made serious efforts to integrate community suggestions. Agreement was reached to increase the width of the road, improve pedestrian access, add new lights, and above all, to preserve the historic architecture.

The construction was completed in four months and the new graceful bridge opened on December 11, 2017. If the past is any guide, the latest Wallkill bridge should be with us until the early 22^{nd} century.



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On April 4 in the Shawangunk Town Hall, Pete Bedrossian, program director from the National Purple Heart Hall of Honor in New York's Hudson River Valley, presented a talk describing how the award known as The Purple Heart came into being. The award has a history reaching back to the waning days of the American Revolution. The Continental Congress forbade General George Washington from granting commissions and promotions in rank to recognize merit. Yet the General wanted to honor merit, particularly among enlisted soldiers, and so on August 7, 1782, he established the Badge of Military Merit, now known as the Purple Heart. The National Purple Heart Hall of Honor is located right here in the Hudson Valley at the New Windsor Cantonment, where visitors may learn about four centuries of American military history.

A full house honored the Grand Opening of the Knights Lodge and Historical Society Meeting Place on Wednesday, May 2. Board Member Bob Mooney presented a lively presentation on the history and character of the Knights of Pythias in Wallkill. He stressed how the organization served as the most important social gathering point for men (and their families) in the hamlet. Members met every Tuesday night, and everything happened at those meetings; deep friendships formed, deals made, they took care of each other, and tithed to pay burial costs. As Bob concluded, "In the short time that we are here, we have to do good in this life." The house itself was built specifically for the Lodge, with the second floor intended for secret meetings, robes, documents, and special artifacts, strictly restricted to members. After the talk, Bob led attendees upstairs to view the once very private quarters of the Knights of Pythias in Wallkill. * * * *

RESTORATION COMMITTEE REPORT

After a long, hard winter that has only recently loosened its grip, work has begun again at the **Andries DuBois House**. **Board members Libby Ross** and **Karen Dale** continue to focus on the kitchen, one of the oldest rooms. They have stripped the three layers of wallpaper, leaving representative squares to be covered with plexiglass. The walls themselves will be plastered by **Bob Mooney** and his crew before they are covered with historically correct lime-wash. The two handsome wooden window frames are being laboriously scraped of old paint layers before being repainted a close match to the earliest color. This is an ambitious plan, and the workers hope to finish by end of summer. * * * *

The Restoration Committee, consisting of Bob Mooney, Hal Van Aken, Alan White, Joey Vogel, Jim Malloy and Adam Selig, is under negotiation with skilled workmen who will undertake necessary repairs to the left front of the Dubois House. This essential work must be completed before cold weather sets in next fall.

Restoration and work on the **Knights Lodge and Historical Society Meeting Place** also restarted this spring. For those who have not visited the house recently, there is much to admire. Kitchen cabinets are hung, stove and refrigerator installed, electrical and plumbing work completed, new floors installed and finished. This is a beautiful job, completed in time for the May Meeting and Grand Opening for this building. * * * *

Board Members Bob Mooney and Hal Van Aken attended the First Annual Ulster County History Conference at the Rosendale/Marbletown Town Hall in Cottekill on April 18. The Conference was a gathering of representatives from historical societies, historic sites, public and private historians of museums and libraries, to participate in workshop-filled presentations and discussions on archival resources and new ways to present historical information in the digital age. Local, county, and State presenters demonstrated programs that are currently available and ideas for future ones. Their attendance at this important forum is likely to help our Society find better ways to present the past to our community.
