STEWART ADDISON CROWELL (1941-2014): A community remembers

On a snowy evening in February, the hamlet of Wallkill lost one of its most respected and beloved members, Stewart Addison Crowell. For the Wallkill

Public Library, we lost one of our greatest champions – a dedicated trustee who worked tirelessly to support our organization for over 40 years. He carried on this legacy from his grandfather, J. Addison Crowell, one of the original trustees in the 1930s.



Event Highlights

There was a presentation on March 5 at the Town Hall on Child Labor in the Village of Walden in 1890. It was common at that time for children to work in factories, such as the NY Knife Company. By 1913 the practice had significantly diminished. Also, at the meeting special awards were given to World War II veterans Gil McCord and George Low.

An April 2nd open house meeting of the Historical Society was held at the Andries DuBois House. Many displays were set up including the large 1883 Borden map that Wallkill was designed from, the one-room school house display, Borden memorabilia, clothing from the early 1900s, and many more items from the 1800s. Visitors toured the 1769 house built by Andries DuBois and the evening was enlivened also by a 50/50 drawing. Refreshments, wine & cheese were enjoyed by the 41 people, including several new members who joined during the open house.

Dubois House Restoration Report
Thanks to Adam Seelig, Al White, Bob Mooney, Jim
Malloy and Hal Van Aken, the Historical Society has
a new kiosk to display events and information at the
Andries DuBois House. The kiosk was built in spite of
the worst that nature could throw at the Hamlet of
Wallkill. The handsome structure will honor the
memory of Board Trustee Stewart Crowell.



The Restoration Committee has begun to record the volunteer hours that have steadily marked the progress towards restoration. Over the month of April 2014 alone, 58 volunteer hours were contributed to the DuBois House that included interior cleaning, stabilization of the garage, emptying of debris, and plantings. For the Knights of Pythias house, 16.5 volunteer hours went for continued painting of future

meeting rooms and offices on the ground floor. The Restoration Committee always welcomes additional volunteers on Saturday mornings from 10-12!

The Historical Society is initiating hands-on workshop programs in June that are likely to interest our members. You will have two choices: 1) a workshop during which you will make your own planters from easy-to-use concrete (materials provided), adding charm to your own outdoor garden spaces, and 2) a workshop to make bird-specific birdhouses (materials provided). \$30/workshop.
